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1 John Moores Foundation

John Moores Foundation is a registered charity, established in 1964, that gives money to charitable community organisations. They focus on funding projects based in Merseyside and Northern Ireland.

Scheme details:

John Moores Foundation aims to enable people who are marginalised, as a result of social, educational, physical, economic, cultural, geographical or other disadvantage, to improve their social conditions and quality of life. They do this by making grants towards the cost of projects run by charitable community groups whose aims fall within our areas of interest.

Priority is given to small, grass-roots and volunteer driven organisations and new rather than long-established groups. They are particularly interested in supporting those groups that find it more than usually difficult to raise money.

In line with their commitment to equal opportunities, their support projects which aim to counter racism, sexism or discrimination of any kind. Projects which particularly focus on such anti-discrimination would be expected to have input from the discriminated groups concerned.

JMF support projects which aim to break down barriers. To encourage co-operation and joint working between different community and voluntary groups, grants may be given for work involving local trust-building initiatives.

John Moores are an enabling funder and would like to help groups achieve their targets and outcomes in their own way. Groups can be given help with setting up monitoring and evaluation systems that best meet their needs, capacity etc.

2 Arts Council's Touring and Dissemination of Work scheme North/South-NI/RoI

The Arts Council / An Chomhairle Ealaíon's touring schemes have been open to applications from Northern Ireland since beginning in 2010. However, support for performances / exhibitions in Northern Ireland required a separate application to the Arts Council of Northern Ireland.

Both Arts Councils have now agreed to work together to encourage organisations and individuals to extend tours across the border, so the next round of the Touring and Dissemination of Work scheme for July to December 2014 will contain provision for applications to include performances in Northern Ireland. The application process will be streamlined to make it as straightforward as possible for companies / artists in each jurisdiction to tour both North and South.

The same priorities and criteria will apply to both jurisdictions, and applications, as at present, will need to show a working engagement between producers and venues. Both Arts Councils will be seeking to ensure that opportunities for building relationships take place before the application 'window' opens in October.

The search for the most innovative and inspiring voluntary arts groups in the UK and Ireland is now on. The Epic Awards shine a light on the diversity of amateur arts and crafts activity. 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10 World Renowned Experts To Speak on Dangers of Gasification and Potential of Zero Waste

In response to Derry City Council's decision to support plans to build a massive gasification plant to burn waste in Campsie, Zero Waste North West, the local campaign group set up to oppose the plant, will hold its first public meeting this **Thursday (19th Sept) at 7.30 pm in the City Hotel.**

The meeting will be chaired by local campaigner Mary McGuiggan and will include input from two world renowned experts on the waste generation crisis.

Dr. Paul Connett, is an environmental toxicologist and an expert on the dangers of gasification and the potential for zero waste for job creation. He spoke in Derry in 2002 when it first became known that Derry City Council were thinking about incineration as an option for Derry's 'waste' management. Ralph Nader said of Paul Connett, "He is the only person I know who can make waste interesting.

Mal Williams, is executive director of Zero Waste Wales. He has advised the Welsh government which adopted a zero waste strategy in 2010. Mel has extensive practical knowledge of current waste management systems and will provide insight into how we can drive change and move Derry and the North West towards a circular economy with "Zero Waste".

The first fundraiser-gig for the campaign, will be held in Sandino's on Wednesday from 9pm till late. It's a hundred years since the most famous labour dispute in Irish history when James Larkin led 20,000 Dublin workers in a struggle against their employers, resulting in a lockout lasting 5 turbulent months.

Charismatic and headstrong, Larkin had cut his teeth in Belfast and Derry several years before when he led a Dockers' strike, succeeding briefly in uniting Protestants and Catholics in a common cause, with 100,000 people following him in procession around East Belfast, the Falls and Shankill Roads.

Played out against a backdrop of the arming of thousands of Unionists in the North against the imminent Home Rule Bill and the looming shadow of a world war, the Dublin Lockout of 1913 was a human drama of epic proportions.

Jane Cassidy and Maurice Leyden tell the story of the 1913 Dublin Lockout and the Belfast Dockers' Strike which preceded it through words and music, using the songs and ballads of the day to tap into the passions and struggles of the men, women and children of the slums as they embarked on a David and Goliath struggle with their employers. Jane and Maurice are well known singers and broadcasters with an impressive track record in inter-weaving history and folk-song in a way which illumines both. Their most famous show told the story of the 1798 heroine Mary Ann McCracken.

They will be joined on keyboard by Anna Leyden on keyboards, Nollaig Casey on fiddle and well-known Dublin traditional singer Barry Gleeson.

The Lunchtime Events Series runs every Wednesday from **12.30-2.00** (with lunch provided) and features innovative projects, international visitors and thought provoking discussion. The discussion will be captured through video and podcasts through a new soon to be developed website.

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13 Impact of Alcohol Programme

Volunteering Opportunities (2 Volunteers each to do at least 4 hours per week)

This programme is client centred and has been designed to reduce the negative impact on individuals and family members mental health from alcohol misuse. The role of the volunteers will be to support the Project Officer and work closely with clients in a variety of settings. This role will involve outdoor pursuits, organic gardening, personal development and healthy living. Volunteers will be expected to get involved in a wide variety of activities and promote the ethos and values of the programme and Action Mental Health.

The aims of the programme are:-

- To directly engage, support and reintegrate into the community existing and new clients who are vulnerable to harm from alcohol misuse;
- Promote lifestyle choices which support opportunities to capacity build, make educated decisions, learn from peer support which leads to a reduction in alcohol misuse and associated harm;
- To gain resilience this will enable individuals to productively engage with communities, in a social and economic context. To provide interventions leading to a decrease in the number of people presenting to statutory mental health services and/or a decrease in the severity of mental health issues presented due to alcohol misuse.

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


